CREATING YOUR SCHEDULE AND REGISTERING

General Information

1. You can take up to six hours of courses on any topic that you are interested in learning, **OR**
2. You can choose to participate in a Degree Program for the College of your choice. To do this you must meet the Degree Eligibility Requirements and register for classes required by the degree you choose. See the *University of Scouting Degree Programs* section before choosing your classes.

Registration Process

1. Complete the **registration form** on page 6 or register online as soon as possible! **Course sizes are limited** and will be filled on a first come, first served basis. If you wait until the last minute, you might not get the class you want.

2. **Decide if you would like to earn or work towards a degree or not** and then choose courses that you wish to attend. Review the list of courses offered and select your classes (1st choice and 2 alternatives) for any session you plan to attend.

UNIVERSITY OF SCOUTING DEGREE PROGRAMS

University of Scouting training is intended to provide information adult leaders to help them become even better leaders for their units. Adult leaders will find these courses fun and informative. The University of Scouting provides an additional option of applying training to University of Scouting degrees. These degrees allow the Blue Grass Council to recognize adult leaders who have an exceptional interest in developing their leadership skills in Scouting.

You are welcome to take University of Scouting courses solely for the purposes of self-improvement, information, and ideas. These courses will give you tools and ideas to improve your unit and to provide a better program for your Scouts.

You may choose to pursue a University of Scouting degree. The degree programs provide a more structured course of study that exposes you to a broader set of courses to make you a more informed and well-rounded Scout leader.

Beginning in 2017, the University of Scouting degree programs are significantly restructured. The intent is to clarify the requirements to earn a degree, to simplify the degree process, to make University of Scouting degrees more pragmatic for the Scouting program, and to provide more flexibility as course offerings evolve to better meet the needs of Scout leaders.

The new degree program does not apply to the Commissioner Science degrees. Commissioner Science degrees will follow the requirements and guidelines of the national program.

Courses taken prior to 2017 will still count toward University of Scouting degrees. The University of Scouting Committee has looked at prior course offerings and has determined where those courses belong in the new degree structure. However, degrees will be offered only within the new structure and not under former degree requirements. Degrees earned prior to 2017 are still valid.

The new degree program begins with categorizing the University of Scouting courses into 5 categories. These categories are:

- How Scouting Works
- Scouting Skills
- Scouting Ideas
- Scouting Safety
- Special Topics

The degrees are based on meeting a specified number of classroom hours across these five categories. A course that is taught for one session counts as one classroom hour. A course that is taught for two sessions counts as two classroom hours. The classroom hour requirements are specified in the table below:

The University of Scouting assumes that all Scout leaders have completed Youth Protection Training in order to be in their current position. There are some additional eligibility requirements for the degrees listed above. These are:

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL UNIVERSITY OF SCOUTING DEGREE PROGRAMS

- You must be a **registered** member in the Scouting program.
- You must have completed Leader Specific Training for your current position.
- Only courses at the 2005 University of Scouting (initiation of the degree programs) and later count toward degree requirements.

The Commissioner Science degrees follow the national program. These degrees have eligibility requirements in addition to the University of Scouting eligibility requirements. These additional requirements are:

ASSOCIATE DEGREE IN COMMISSIONER SCIENCE

- You must complete all Eligibility Requirements listed above.
- You must have earned a "Trained" patch for your registered position.
- You must complete:
 - **Two core** courses required for the Bachelor degree (courses numbered 100-199).
 - **Two required** courses from the required Commissioner Science class list (courses numbered 200-299).
 - **One elective** course from any University of Scouting college.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE IN COMMISSIONER SCIENCE

- You must complete all Eligibility Requirements listed above.
- You must be currently registered as a Commissioner.
- You must complete:
 - **Five** courses required for the Bachelor degree (courses numbered 100-199).
 - **Two elective** courses (courses number 300-399).

MASTER'S DEGREE IN COMMISSIONER SCIENCE

- You must complete all Eligibility Requirements listed above.
- You must be currently registered as a Commissioner.
- You must have completed a Bachelor's Degree.
- You must have earned an Arrowhead Honor.
- You must complete **seven additional courses** beyond the Bachelor's Degree selected from the courses on the Master's level (courses numbered 400-499).

DOCTORATE DEGREE IN COMMISSIONER SCIENCE

- You must complete all Eligibility Requirements listed above.
- You must have completed the Master's Degree.
- You must have received the Commissioner's Key Award.
- You must complete **ten additional courses**. Five must be selected from the courses on the Doctorate level (courses numbered 500-599). This is a total of 24 courses.
- You must complete a thesis or research project on any topic of value to Scouting in the Blue Grass Council. The topic and final paper must be approved by the Dean of the University of Scouting's Commissioner's College and the Council Staff Advisor to the University of Scouting.
- You must serve at least one year on the College of Commissioner Science staff.

Records of previous year's University of Scouting will be provided upon request. To request your record, please call the council office.
